

## MEDIATE BC SOCIETY TRAINING IN FAMILY DYNAMICS

## LEARNING OBJECTIVES FOR TRAINING IN FAMILY DYNAMICS:

Applicants for admission to the Family Roster of Mediate BC should have completed a combination of structured learning experiences totaling 21 hours, which together include the following objectives:

- I. Applicants should be able to define, discuss and demonstrate the appropriate and timely use of the following knowledge in working with a family in a mediation:
  - 1. The dynamics of separation and divorce including:
    - a) the psychological effects of family breakdown on family members;
    - b) the stages of the separation and divorce process;
    - c) the appropriate custody, access and visitation arrangements by age and maturity of the child: and
    - d) child development issues as those relate to the specifics of family re-organization and parenting plans.
  - 2. Abuse and control issues including:
    - a) family violence in the context of relationship power imbalances, control and abuse;
    - b) the "cycle of violence";
    - c) the "Power and Control Wheel";
    - d) the dynamics and effects of abuse on family members (including children);
    - e) characteristics of an abused person and why they may choose not to leave an abusive relationship;
    - f) characteristics of an abuser;
    - g) indicators of danger in abuse cases;
    - h) special issues with cultural groups;
    - i) characteristics of children who witness abuse;
    - j) child protection matters associated with family abuse and violence;
    - k) safety issues in mediation;

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- l) knowledge of (including strengths and limitations of) criminal and civil procedures and protection orders that may be of assistance in abuse cases;
- m) knowledge of ethical rules and Standards of Professional Conduct for mediators in abuse cases;
- n) knowledge of protective procedures and methods that can be used to adapt mediation processes in cases involving power imbalance or abuse;
- o) knowledge of special provisions for use in parenting plans in high conflict abuse cases; and
- p) how you would meet the concerns for your own safety when working with a client who has been abused or is an abuser.
- 3. Mental health, addictions and other issues which may compromise the person's ability to participate in mediation and capacity to consent.

- II. Applicants should be able to demonstrate the following in an appropriate and timely manner:
  - 1. The competent use of assessment tools and techniques to either screen inappropriate family abuse cases from mediation, or to detect and assess family abuse during the mediation.
  - 2. Safe referral techniques.
  - 3. Safe termination techniques including use of information about sources of help for abused family members in communities.
